

When he came to America, Esko had had only two years of English so that at first he had some interesting encounters with American slang and with some of our everyday expressions.

Even though he was in a strange country, Esko entered into the activities at CHS with enthusiasm. He was a member of the Mixed Chorus, and was made an honorary member of the Centerville Chapter of the National Honor Society. He became an ardent booster for the Big Reds and attended football and basketball games with zest. Since he enjoys dancing, he went to several local dances. He attended the Lutheran Church and was active in their Youth group and sang in the choir.

Everyone in Centerville was interested in Fsko, and many clubs asked him to speak at their meetings. We all hope that he will remember his year at CHS as one of pleasure and profit.






"MOMENTS TO REMEMBER"




BOARD OF EDUCATION PLANS AHEAD

Spanish and French classes present to the students not only the language but also the customs typical of these countries.

MATHEMATICS: A FORMULA FOR LOGICAL REASONING


CHS offers four and a half years of mathematics. The courses include two years of general math, two years of algebra, one year of plane geometry, one semester of trigonometry and a year of higher mathematics. An accelerated mathematics course was started last year in the eighth grade; the students will continue this course through high school.

Centerville participates in the national mathematics testing program, and this year two CHS students, Don Linder and Kent Stansberry, won third and fourth places in the state in single scores. Don Linder, Kent Stansberry and Esko Riihimaki as a team won first place in the state.





HOMEMAKING AND VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE





MAINTENANCE AND FOOD: BASIC NECESSITIES







GOLF TEAM WINS CONFERENCE






