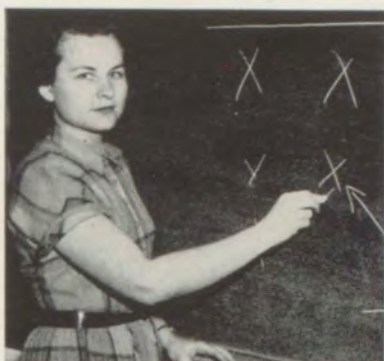

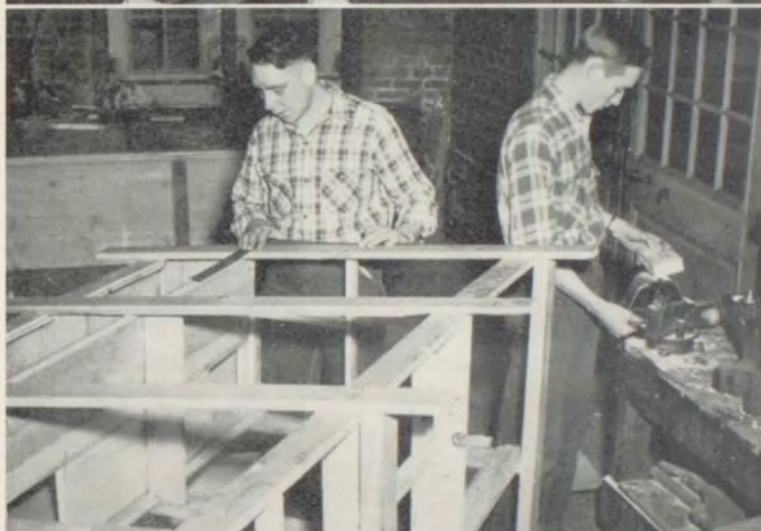

Next week we have the reptile man. He wriggles,

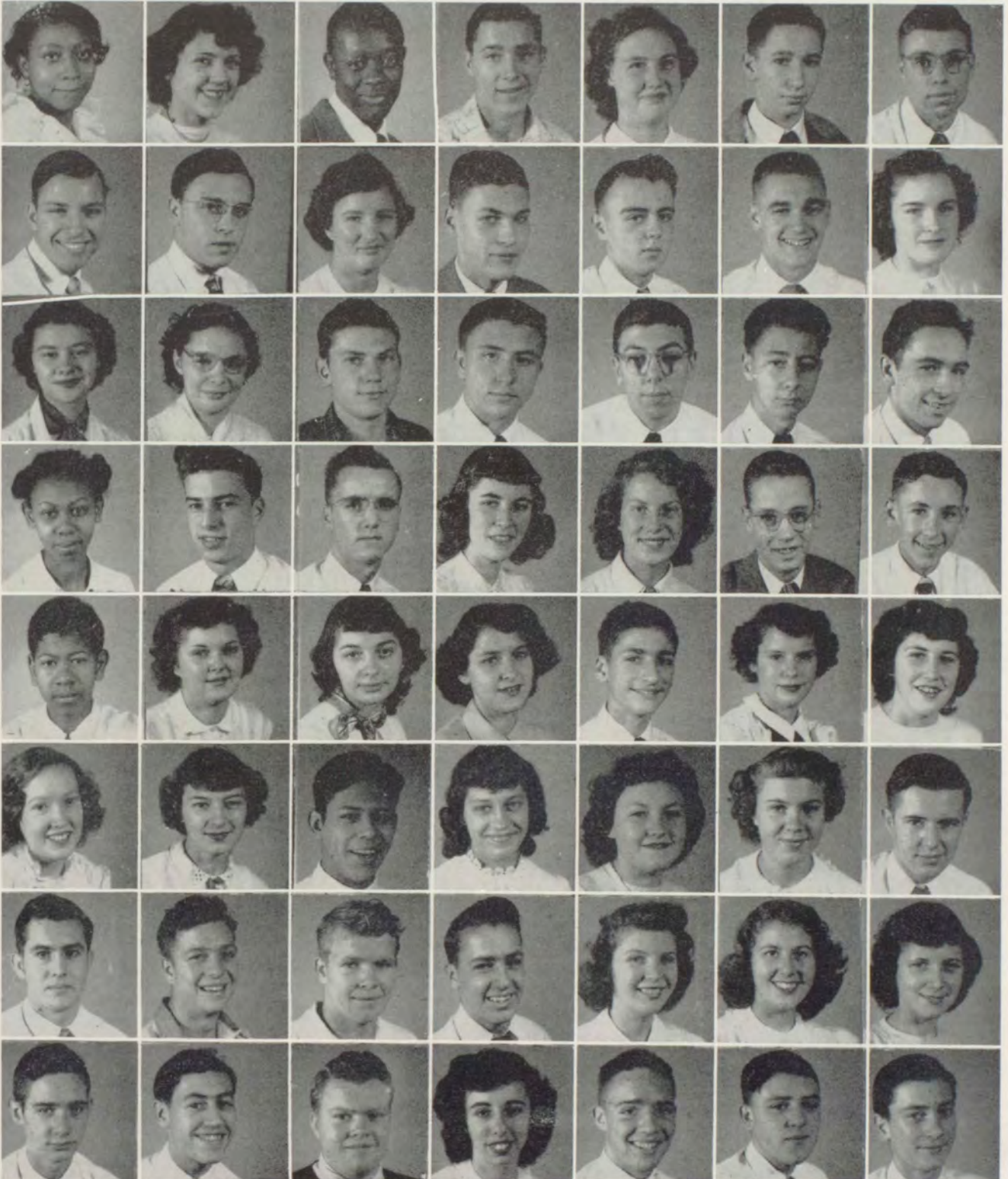

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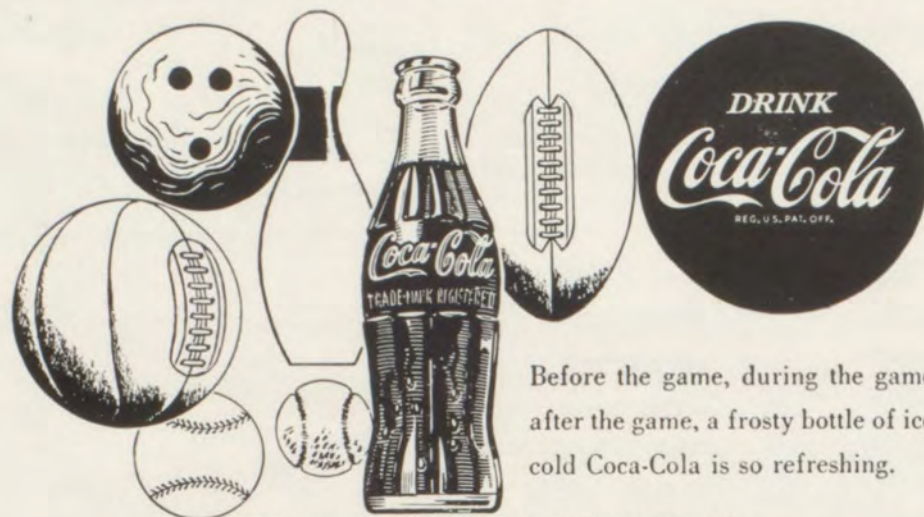
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he creeps. He crawls on his belly. We give you Doyle Hedgecock—our reptile man.
